

# 1. Introduction



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

# 2. General Rules for Design-in

In order to obtain optimal GNSS performances, there are some rules which require attentions for applying the GNSS modules.

## 2.1 Circuit Design

## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6,PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301


## 2.1.1 Power supply VCC

Providing a clean and stable power supply is required for the GNSS module to obtain high-quality performance. Unstable power source will cause a significant negative impact on the performance. To achieve high-quality performance, the VCC ripple must be restricted under 50mV<sub>pp</sub>. Here are some important suggestions for main power circuit design:

(1) Add ferrite bead, power choke or low pass filter for power noise reduction.

(2) Linear regulator is better than switch DC/DC power supplier in ripple.

(3) Use enough decoupling capacitors beside VCC for stable voltage.

## 2.1.2 VBACKUP backup battery

## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6,PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

There are 2 applications in applying VBACKUP to the GNSS modules.


## Application 1:

Backup power can be used when the main power is not supplied to keep RTC running and receiving navigation data. When VCC goes off for a short term, with this backup power, the GNSS module is capable of succeeding a faster TTFF, shorter Time-to-First-Fix, and short hot start time after the power is regained.

For most system, it is recommended to provide the module with backup power (e.g. Li-Ion rechargeable coin battery, super cap). See the figure provided below for reference design.

For "super capacitor reference design", please refer to Appendix I.


The module has a built-in battery recharge circuit. It charges the rechargeable coin battery while the module is powered on.

## Application 2:

GNSS module has a built-in charging circuit which charges the rechargeable coin battery. If the coin battery is not installed at the VBACKUP, the module will still function but only that the module will perform cold start at each power on event.

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## 2.1.3 UART / I<sup>2</sup>C/ SPI Serial Interface

## (a) UART 0 (RX/TX)


## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

- (1) UART is the TTL level interface that carries the baud rate ranging from 4800 bps to 115200 bps.
- (2) Placing damping resistor on the RX and TX of the GNSS module could limit the interference from host MCU or high speed digital logics. Fine tuning the damping resistor is required to efficiently suppress interference. Since the damping resistor is wire wound component, it may function as choke coil.
- (3) Please do not connect diode(s) to RX/TX as it will decrease signal driving capability which might adversely affect RX/TX signal level. In some cases no data output will occur.
- (4) If RS232 logic-level is needed for any particular application, the level shifter will be necessary. For more information, please refer to "UART to RS232 Interface" in Appendix III.
- (5) If USB logic-level is needed for any particular application, please refer to "UART to USB Interface" in Appendix IV for more information.

## (b) I<sup>2</sup>C (SCL/SDA)

## **Compatible Model: Gmm-3301**

- (1) The  $I^2C$  interface is mainly connected to external devices. MT3333 supports only slave mode (default slave address is 0x10). MT3333 has 256bytes URAM mode and 8-byte FIFO mode for transmitting and receiving data. The bit rate is up to 400 kb/s for fast mode. In addition, MT3333 supports manual or automatic indicator for data transfer in the slave mode. Device addresses in the slave mode are programmable.
- (2) Pull-up resistor must be added for I2C bus:



## (c) SPI (CS/CLK/MISO/MOSI)

## Compatible Model: Gmm-3301

(1) The serial peripheral interface port manages the communication between digital BB and external devices. MT3333 supports only slave mode. The slave has 4 byte-register mode or URAM mode. In the URAM mode, the transmitted and received data size is 256 bytes. The clock phase and clock polarity are selectable. MT3333 supports manual or automatic indicator for data transfer in the slave mode. The bit rate is up to 700kb/s.

## 2.1.4 GND-Ground

# Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6,PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

Make sure all GND pins of the module are connected to a good ground plane.

The separation of ground between GNSS module and the rest of the system is recommended to avoid interference. If this setup is not possible, it is best to follow these typical rules: segmentation of ground between digital and analogue system, high current and low current system, and different radiation systems in general (such as GNSS and GPRS)

One way to segment the ground is to place digital and noise component at one corner of the board, while placing analog and quiet components at the opposite corner of the board. Make sure there is no crossing of microstrip or current between the two component sets with ground of each sets to be connected to one point only.

Another way is to place the two different sets at different layers of the board while the ground of each layer is connected to one point only which is preferable located at the border of the board practically.



## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gmm-3301

GNSS antenna is a receiving part of the device to acquire weak GNSS signal from sky. Popular solution would be ceramic patch antenna because of its small form factor with low cost. There are two types of antennas: passive and active.


Passive antenna is solely by itself without signal amplifier such as LNA. Examples are patch antenna and chip antenna. If you have your own patch antenna, it is required to get it fine tuned for the specific module model to obtain the best possible signal strength.

External antenna is a standalone device integrates with LNA and patch antenna with a RF cable for higher gain and better performance than that of passive antenna.

Antenna can be chosen according to radiation efficiency, radiation pattern, gain, bandwidth, form factor and cost. Make sure the ground plane is sufficient for the antenna to operate with good enough performance.

#### **Designing Patch antenna with GNSS module**

- (1) In general, a  $50\Omega$  patch antenna will work well with GNSS module. The antenna can be connected to the Antenna IN pin with a  $50\Omega$  impedance trace.
- (2) Pleases keep the patch antenna far away from noise source such as switching power supply, high speed digital logics or radar wave guide.
- (3) The  $50\Omega$  trace should be kept as short as possible to reduce the chance of picking up the noise from air and PCB. A simple direct-line trace is most recommended.
- (4) If needed, a matching circuit could be placed between patch antenna and GNSS module. The matching circuit design should be discussed with the module and patch antenna maker.
- (5) For 50  $\Omega$  matching, please refer to ""50  $\Omega$  Antenna Matching" in Appendix II.



PCB trace design for antenna impedance matching




#### Select External Antennal architecture with GNSS module

An external antenna needs DC power to function. A typical method is to feed DC power into the RF trace. The external antenna can extract the power from the RF trace; thus we can use the RF trace to transport both RF signal and DC voltage. To fully achieve this, we use a RF chock coil to couple the DC power to RF trace.

For your reference, in general, GlobalTop modules provide the circuit connecting external antenna and power feeding method as depicted in the figure below. Please select the module prudently while applying the design with an external antenna.


**Mode 1**(i.e. **Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B)) :** The power supply for the external antenna needs to be externally fed into the module via the VANT pin and connect antenna to Antenna IN pin.




#### **Power Feeding Configuration**

## 2.1.6 1PPS Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6,PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

1PPS signal is an output pulse signal used for timing application. Its electrical characteristics are:


Low Voltage level: 0~0.4V

High Voltage level: 2.8~3.1V

Period: 1s

Accuracy (jitter):±10ns

100ms pulse width duration (Firmware customization for pulse width duration is available)

## Free run 1PPS output before 3D\_FIX

GlobalTop standard GNSS module outputs 1PPS signal after the module obtained 3D\_FIX. This is a factory default setting.

For an always 1PPS signal output configuration, regardless of 3D\_Fix or not, this is available to our customer via firmware customization service. Please be noted that the accuracy before 3D\_Fix on the 1PPS is a free run and will lock until GPS 3D\_Fix.

## Cable delay compensation

In some cases a long distance connection (~300m) may be needed. For a timing application, the cable length is critical.

For more information on 1PPS signal transmission delay please refer to Appendix V.


Delay caused by the cable length could be compensated with firmware setting. Please contact us if that is useful for your implementation.

## 2.1.7 3D\_Fix

## Compatible Model: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM

3D\_Fix signal is an output pulse signal used for GNSS fix application. Its electrical characteristics are:

Low Voltage level: 0~0.4V High Voltage level: 2.8~3.1V Source current (Max.): 14mA, sink current 14mA



## 2.2 Layout Guideline

Please follow the layout guideline for the right GNSS module when design.

## 2.2.1 Layout underneath the GNSS module

## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6,PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

In general, GNSS modules have high receiving sensitivity at around -165dBm. During the hardware integration, try to avoid noise or harmonic in these bands to prevent unnecessary reception degradation (Beidou 1561.098MHz ±2.046MHz and GPS 1572.42MHz±2MHz or GLONASS 1598.0625~1605.375MHz).


In modern GNSS positioning products, most host system contains noise generating components such as LCD screen, MCU, high speed digital and RF system (i.e. GSM, BT, Wi-Fi, DVB-T). In order to minimize the noise effect please design with noises source in mind and avoid it is highly recommended.

#### For modules Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B) & Gmm-3301

Don't leave any trace or mark underneath the GNSS module where the circled area is pointed in the figure below. In other words, give GNSS module a clean GND plane.

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




GNSS module on a clean GND plane


#### For modules Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6 & PA6E-CAM

Place a hole according to the location of RF feeding pin in module. The hole will provide an area to fit the RF feeding pin on your system PCB and provide the appropriate hole size.

## 2.2.2 Keep far away from high profile or metal canned components

## Compatible Model: Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM


It is good practice to place GNSS module far away from any high profile component especially with metal case enclosed components such as E-CAP, Coin battery, Pin Header. The Antenna field pattern can be affected and pattern distortion can happen. At the worst case it will decrease the GNSS signal up to ~10dB.



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## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

Place the decoupling capacitors for VCC close to GNSS module. Place the damping resistors for TX/RX close to GNSS module.


## Do not place:


## 2.2.4 Trace

## Compatible Model: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

- (1) The USB differential signals should be trace closely and of equal length for better noise immunity and minimum radiation.
- (2) Apply 50 ohm impendence RF trace for correct impedance matching.
- (3) Any right angle turn in a trace routing should be done with two 135 degree turn or an arc turn.



It is better to have independent trace of power source for any device



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## 2.2.5 Ground Segmentation

## Compatible Models: Gmm-g3, Gmm-g3(B), Gms-g6a, Gms-g9, Gms-g6, Gms-b6, PA6E-CAM, Gmm-3301

In general, the separation of ground between GNSS module and the rest of the system is recommended to avoid interference. If this is not possible, it is best to follow these typical rules: segmentation of ground between digital and analogue system, high current and low current system, and different radiation systems such as GNSS and GPRS.

One way to segment the ground is to place digital and noise component at one corner of the board, while placing analog and quiet components at the opposite corner of the board. Make sure there is no crossing of microstrip or current between the two component sets with ground of each sets to be contacted to one point only.

Another way to do this is the place the two different sets at different layers of the board, while the ground of each layer is contacted in one point only which is preferable located at the border of the board practically.

## 2.2.6 Ground Plane


## (1) Compatible Models: Gms-g9,PA6E-CAM, Gms-g6, Gms-b6

For Gms-g9, PA6E-CAM, Gms-g6, Gms-b6 A large GND plane directly underneath the module could enhance the magnetic-field line of the antenna for better GNSS signal reception. Typically it will improve ~2dB maximum.

It is strongly recommended to have a ground plane designed underneath the GNSS module as big as possible.

The recommended thickness for the ground layer is 0.5 to 1 OZ (0.0175 to 0.035 mm)


It is best to place the ground plane on the top layer of the PCB, directly underneath the GNSS module as shown in the figure below.



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


Ground Plane for FR4 Design

## (2)Compatible Model: Gms-g6a

**For Gms-g6a** A built-in Chip Antenna module, a special ground plane is required to improve chip antenna reception performance.

As shown in the figure, the area circled where the chip antenna area is when placed on the PCB, no ground plan should be placed on this chip antenna area and also all other layers underneath.




Note: The clearance area size at least 15x6.3mm.

To enhance the antenna efficiency for better GNSS signal reception, it is recommended to cover the rest of the PCB top layer with ground plane except where the chip antenna seats as shown below.



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Variation in reception sensitivity according to the size of the GND plane is given in the table below.

Ground Plane Area (A x B) (mm)	Sensitivity increase in dB	
No Ground Plane	OdB	
2x 20 mm	+2dB~+4dB	
7 x 20 mm	+4dB ~+5dB

## 2.2.7 Metal effect on the GNSS module


## Compatible Model: Gms-g6a

**For Gms-g6a** Chip Antenna is a sensitive component with environment.

A consideration regarding to the housing and the environment where it was placed should be carefully taken.

- (1) The housing (case) of the host device should not be made of or include any conductive material for the basic antenna reception.
- (2) The host device should not be placed underneath of a conductive material such as metal case, metal film or plastic housing coated in conductive material, which blocks GNSS signal from reaching the antenna; and if there is metal material placed underneath the chip antenna, this will also decrease the antenna reception performance.

As shown in the figure, the distance (d) between metal and module should be kept as far as possible.



The table would give an insight on how reception performance can be negatively affected in regard to the distance between the metal and the mounted module.

Distance (mm)	Sensitivity decrease in dB
0mm	-14 dB ~-18dB
1mm	-7dB~-9dB
3mm	-6dB ~-7dB
5mm	-3dB~-5dB
7 mm	-2dB~-4dB
10mm*	OdB



# 3. Thermal Profile for SMD Modules

Average ramp-up rate (25 ~ 150°C): 3°C/sec. max.

Average ramp-up rate (270°C to peak): 3°C/sec. max.


Preheat: 175 ± 25°C, 60 ~ 120 seconds

Temperature maintained above 217°C: 60~150 seconds

Peak temperature: 250 +0/-5°C, 20~40 seconds

Ramp-down rate: 6°C/sec. max.

Time 25°C to peak temperature: 8 minutes max.





Please use the dimension of PCB pad as reference and shrink the size by 0.1 to 0.2 mm and use that as layout for paste mask. (For PCB pad layout, please see "Recommended PCB pad layout" on individual GNSS module data sheet)

## Manual Soldering

Soldering iron: Bit Temperature: Under 380°C | Time: Under 3 second.



# 4. Troubleshooting

#### How to check for the working status of GNSS module?

The first thing to check for is the NMEA sentence output through Tx using various application tools. For example: you may use windows default tool –Hyperterminal in WinXP or you may use other GNSS application program.

If there is no NMEA output at the TX pin, this indicates that the module is currently not working. Please double check your schematic design. The list down below is a go through list of possible items to check.

#### Item 1: VCC

Top

The voltage should be kept between 3V to 4.3V. (Typical: 3.3V). Please double-check.

#### Item 2: VBACKUP

The voltage should be kept between 2.0V~4.3V. **(Typical: 3.0V).** If backup battery is not installed for the VBACKUP pin, the pin could still be measured as the voltage comes from the built-in battery recharging circuit. It is recommended to provide power to VBACUP pin as it is used to keep RTC time running and stored navigation data. Please double-check

#### Item 3: 3D-FIX

If all the measurements are within the specifications, please also measure 3D-FIX signal. Before 2D Fix, the pin should output 1 second high followed by 1 second low signal.

**Notes:** This is not applicable to those with customized 1PPS which has an always 1PPS signal configuration as described in "Free run 1PPS" in **section 2.1.6 1PPS**.

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
# **Appendix I: Super Capacitor Design**

#### **About Super Capacitors**

Super capacitor has lifetime similar to that of aluminum electrolytic capacitor. The service life of a super capacitor is greatly dependent on the operating temperature, humidity, applied voltage, current and backup time. Therefore, the service life is determined based on the backup time set by the customer.

## How to calculate the backup time

The example below teaches how to calculate the backup time.






# Appendix II: 50 Ω Antenna Matching

We used AppCAD tool to simulate 50  $\Omega$  impedance for RF PCB layout.

Note:

For multiple-layer layout, designer could place a ground layer in the 2nd layer to minimize the trace width in specific PCB (such FR4) and impedance.

For impedance calculation, free software to calculate trace width or impedance is available.



# Appendix III: UART to RS232 Interface

Typically RS232 or USB interface is required to connect the PC to the GlobalTop GNSS module for communication. Majority of GlobalTop modules use a set of communication port in TTL-logic. Some newer ones supports for direct USB connection. A bridge IC is needed for RS232 signal conversion. The supported baud-rates are: 4800, 9600, 14400, 19200, 38400, 57600, and 115200 bps.

Please refer to the reference circuit below for RS232 signal conversion. SP3320 IC is used here as an example.



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


# **Appendix IV: UART to USB Interface**

If the GlobalTop module you have purchased does not come with USB interface, possibly it is designed to connect the module to an external USB IC. To further enhance the transferring speed, use one that is capable of USB version 2.0. Once the driver for the chosen USB Bridge IC is successfully installed onto Windows or other operating system, the USB Bridge IC will automatically be recognized as a COM port.

Note: proper driver must be installed or else the operating system will not recognize the device!

Please refer to the reference circuits below for the conversion: CP2102 IC is used here as an example.



(The Pin29 and Pin30 are the bottom ground pads which are not documented in the IC datasheet. Customer may ignore these two pins in the drawing)


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# Appendix V: How to efficiently transfer 1PPS through extended distances

There are several things to note when transferring 1PPS signal through a long cable which will result in 1PPS signal degradation, increase in noise and increase in signal delay. As the 1PPS signal traveling through the communication cable, impedance matching must be implemented to prevent wave form distortion. Depending on user's application, OP-amp can be added to effectively control the accuracy of the voltage level for the 1PPS signal.

When using 1PPS signal for time synchronization, the OP-amp chosen should have a **high slew rate** property to prevent large delay in the 1PPS. The accuracy level of 1PPS for GlobalTop GNSS module is within 100ns. This applies to most of GlobalTop's MTK GNSS modules. The reference design below can be used to improve accuracy to within 80ns.





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
## 1PPS Delay Time:

When using coaxial cable for long distances communication using OP-amp for amplification. Please pay close attention to the coaxial cable time delay and the rising time of the wave form due to OP-amp's Slew Rate. A brief explanation for this is given below.

The figure below shows the specification of the coaxial cable with the model number RG6U.



#### Calculating the delay time in respect to the communication cable length

The simplest method to calculate this is to have a good grasp on the relationships of the three parameters.

- 1. The speed of the traveling waveform
- 2. The distance of the wave form traveled
- 3. The delay time

$$\frac{\boldsymbol{\ell}}{\boldsymbol{\mu}_{\mathbf{p}}} = T$$

 $\ell$  = Distance of the wave form traveled (m)

 $\mu_{p} =$  Speed of the waveform (m/s)

 $\mathbf{T} = \mathsf{Delay}$  Time (ns)




If the speed of the waveform (in coaxial cable) is unknown, it is possible to use a known coaxial cable length to test. For example, the signal travels in 1 meter of coaxial cable can have its delay time measured by the oscilloscope as 5ns and consequently the  $\mu_p$  will be 2 \* 10<sup>8</sup> (m/s).

If the value of capacitance and inductance for the coaxial cable is known, then  $\mu_p$  (m/s) can also be calculated.

$$\mu_{\mathbf{p}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt[n]{\mathbf{LC}}}$$

Moreover, more other coaxial cable electromagnetic fundamental parameters along with the inner and outer diameter of the physical cable can be used in combination to perform theoretical calculations.

## Waveform rising time caused by OP-amp



The left figure shows Slew Rate: which is the time needed for rising waveform. When the SR (V/µsec) of OPA is higher, the rising time will be shortened as well.

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## **Recommended OP-amp**

If inadequate OP-amp is chosen (i.e. with low slew rate), the delay at the rising time introduced to the waveform can be significantly larger than that of the coaxial wire.

We recommend using **OP-amp 301** to decrease the waveform rising time

## Specification of OP-amp 301:

- Low Power: 9.5mA (Typ) on 5.5V
- Single Power: 2.7V ~ 5.5V
- High Slew Rate: 80 V/μsec
- Tiny Packages: MSOP and SOT23

## Voltage degradation of communication cable

We have tested a 10m long coaxial cable and only insignificant amount of voltage degradation is observed. Users should not worry this issue.



# **Appendix VI: Caution for Reflow Soldering Process**

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#### **Other Cautionary Notes on Reflow-Soldering Process:**

- 1. Module must be pre-baked before going through SMT solder reflow process.
- 2. The usage of solder paste must follow "First-in-First-out" principle. Opened solder paste needs to be monitored and recorded in a timely manner (refer to IPQC standards for related documentation and examples)
- 3. Temperature and humidity must be controlled within SMT production line and storage area. Temperature of 23°C, 60±5% RH humidity is recommended. (please refer to IPQC standards for related documentation and examples)
- 4. When performing solder paste printing, please notice if the amount of solder paste is excessive or insufficient, as both conditions may lead to defects such as electrical shortage, empty solder ... etc.
- 5. Make sure the vacuum mouthpiece is able to bear the weight of the GPS module to prevent positional shift during the loading process.
- 6. Before the PCBA is going through the reflow-soldering process, the operators should check by his/her own eyes to see if there are positional offset to the module.
- 7. The reflow temperature and its profile data must be measured before the SMT process and match the levels and guidelines set by IPQC.
- 8. If SMT protection line is running a double-sided process for PCBA, please process GPS module during the second pass only to avoid repeated reflow exposures of the GPS module. Please contact GlobalTop beforehand if you must process GPS module during the 1<sup>st</sup> pass of doubleside process.




Figure 6.2: Place GPS module right-side up when running reflow-solder process, do not invert.

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## Manual Soldering

## Soldering iron:

Heat Temperature: Under 380°C | Time: Under 3 sec.

## Notes:

- 1. Please do not directly touch the soldering pads on the surface of the PCB board to prevent further oxidation
- 2. The solder paste must be defrosted to room temperature before use so it can return to its optimal working temperature. The time required for this procedure is unique and dependent on the properties of the solder paste used.
- 3. The steel plate must be properly assessed before and after use, so its measurement stays strictly within the specification set by SOP.
- 4. Please watch out for the spacing between soldering joint, as excess solder may cause electrical shortage
- 5. Please exercise with caution and do not use extensive amount of flux due to possible siphon effects on neighboring components, which may lead to electrical shortage.
- 6. Please do not use the heat gun for long periods of time when removing the shielding or inner components of the GPS module, as it is very likely to cause a shift to the inner components and will leads to electrical shortage.
